
- 1. Writing Activity Keep it Wild! Introduction to a 500 word piece (approx 1 ½ pages double-spaced) about a special memory that connects you to a wild place in Montana. Think about a topic.
- 2. Sample essay read aloud from the book, A Wildland Ethic.
- 3. Begin to draft your essay, in your own writing, on notebook paper. You will turn this in with a typed, hard copy.

1/25 THURSDAY

- 1. Review the Keep it Wild! essay rubric. Continue drafting your essay, in your writing, on notebook paper.

- 1. Meet with members from other groups who have the same Novel Research topic. Compare info.
- 2. Turn your Novel Research doc in to TEAMS. Be prepared to share with your group on Monday.
- 3. Read or continue working on essay. Share with at least 2 peers for feedback. You must come to class with your finished typed essay on Monday. You must also hand in your handwritten copy.



Send your 500 word essay; double spaced, two pages, 12-font, to wild.divide@wildmontana.org. Please include a cover page that includes your name, school, grade and email address. Essays are due February 1st and the winner will be chosen by March 4th. The book, "A Wildland Ethic", containing 46 essays about wild places and wild things may help you get started. Two of these books were sent to your school's librarian and English teacher in the past couple of years.
